#### Lost jumper




Please could you check at home to see if Theo's school jumper has managed to sneak in without being








## Owls

<u>4 October 1990</u>: The children walked to Church carrying harvest gifts which the vicar received at the chancel steps and two children then put them round the altar. A short service was conducted by the Revd Clive Malpass. About twelve parents joined us. Our gifts will be auctioned and the money for them sent to Sri Lanka in response to the Bishop's appeal.

**<u>30 September 1903</u>**: Askrigg parents have a habit of taking their children away during September for "holidays". Several families have been away this year and the loss of attendances from this cause is 135.

## **EYFS News column**

This week we went on the most glorious autumn walk. We paused for a moment to appreciate living and learning in Wensleydale. We noticed several signs of autumn: colour changing leaves, bonfires, dew, misty clouds in front of the sun and a chill in the crisp, sweet air. All this on our doorstep. How blessed are we?

We have started talking about Harvest in collective worship as part of our Christian Value 'Thankfulness'. We have watched combine harvesters courtesy of YouTube and sung that old favourite fit to burst (all facing forwards surrounded by fresh air) 'Big Red Combine Harvester'.

In maths we have been sorting, matching and making comparisons. We have read stories to support this – Monkey Puzzle and Puffin Peter. The children spotted the similarities and differences. We then sorted autumn natural resources and shells. We also loved matching our Compare Bears in lots of different ways including hiding some for fun. (More bear themes next week).

Phonics is sailing along smoothly. Parent feedback is that the children are enjoying practising at home. One little girl is really keen on writing 'g' and 't'. Is that for future orders as an 18 year old?! All I can say is like mother like daughter! Obviously due to this week's GDPR training (that's an hour of our lives we won't get back) I will not under any circumstances name the family. To be honest it could apply to several families.

Other activities this week include exploring autumn apples: chopping, peeling and grating. All under the objective of testing to see what floats. Being Early Years children, they took the activity along a different route of investigating how to make the biggest splash. So we turned it into a PE game working on our aims, throwing techniques and adding an element of maths by scoring and adding totals.

Yes another fabulous week in Robins class. Looking forward to next week.
