### From the Vicarage

#### 'Angels from the realms of Glory'





It's a season for Angels. As Advent progresses and Christmas approaches, the display of angels around us will increase in number. They may be hanging from a tree, adorning festive table mats, candle holders, shop windows or street light displays. They may feature on Christmas Cards or gift tags. We will sing of them in Carols or be entertained by them in the annual Nativity Play ... they really are everywhere and I always find this a comforting reminder of a great spiritual truth.

The word angel comes from the Greek word 'Angelos' meaning a messenger or a courier. Angels are not random interventions in life but the directed and purposeful appearances of God's messengers. The Bible teaches us that angels intervene in the affairs of nations, that God uses them to deliver messages or judgement, that they can guide, comfort, challenge, protect and fight on God's instructions.

Published in 1566, Martin Luther's book 'Table Talk' states that: 'An angel is a spiritual creature without a body created by God for the service of Christendom and the Church.' They featured in announcing the first arrival of Jesus Christ eg Luke 1:26, Luke 2:9&13 and we're told of how they will certainly feature in his glorious return: Matt.25:31, Rev.5:11.

There are plenty of autobiographical accounts of people having met or experienced encounters with Angels. Indeed, you may have one yourself. I remember one in particular relating to the 19th century South Pacific Missionary John G Paton. He recalled in his memoirs a conversation he had later had with some natives who were intent on murdering him, his wife and everyone else at their missionary station. After having completely surrounded the encampment and with the missionary's lives in his hand, the chief gave the surprising order for his warriors to withdraw and return to their village. He later explained to Paton the reason why. He realized that he was hopelessly outnumbered by the 'hundreds of men dressed in shining clothes with drawn swords in their hands'.

'The angel of the Lord encamps around those who fear Him' Ps.34:7

So; as we take in the varied display of angels this Christmas, I hope that we might reflect upon their spiritual reality. That they are servants of God, fulfilling His will, reflecting His glory, providing comfort and protection and, above all else; calling us to Worship.

I look forward to seeing you all at the very many different services and events in the weeks that lie ahead as we do precisely that. Happy Christmas!

#### **ADVENT?**



For many Christians unfamiliar with the liturgical year, there may be some confusion surrounding the meaning of the Advent season. Some people may know that the Advent season focuses on expectation and think that it serves as an anticipation of Christ's birth in the season leading up to Christmas. This is part of the story, but there's more to Advent.

The word "Advent" is derived from the Latin word *adventus*, meaning "Arrival." It is believed that during the 4<sup>th</sup> and 5<sup>th</sup> centuries Advent was a season of preparation for the baptism of new Christians at the January feast of Epiphany. During this season of preparation, Christians would spend 40 days in penance, prayer, and fasting to prepare for this celebration. Originally, there was little connection between Advent and Christmas.

By the 6th century, however, Roman Christians had tied Advent to the coming of Christ. The "arrival" they had in mind however, was not Christ's first coming in the manger in Bethlehem, but rather his second as the judge of the world. It was not until the Middle Ages that the Advent season was explicitly linked to Christ's first coming at Christmas. Today, the season of Advent lasts for four Sundays leading up to Christmas. It's a season of expectation and preparation. A time of looking back on the promises of God that were fulfilled in the birth of Jesus Christ but also in looking forward to the promises that are yet to come and of His return in glory. It's so easy for us to become lost in the busyness of the preparation for Christmas Day that we can forget these things and lose sight of the joy that there is in walking closely with the Lord along the way. So this Advent, why not plan in some essential down time and enjoy a 'Coffee with the Lord?' Put on some music, light a candle and spend some time with the one who loves you and longs to spend some quality time with you.





#### **Advent Wreaths**

The Advent wreath first appeared in Germany in 1839. A Lutheran minister working at a mission for children created a wreath out of the wheel of a cart. He placed twenty small red candles and four large white candles inside the ring. The red candles were lit on weekdays and the four white candles were lit on Sundays.

Eventually, the Advent wreath was created out of evergreens, symbolizing everlasting life in the midst of winter and death. The circle reminds us of God's unending love and the eternal life He makes possible. Advent candles are often nestled in the evergreen wreath. Additional decorations, like holly and berries, are sometimes added. Their red colour points ahead to Jesus' sacrifice and death. Pinecones can symbolize the new life that Jesus brings through His resurrection. The most common Advent candle tradition involves four candles. A new candle is lit on each of the four Sundays before Christmas. Different colours may be used to represent something different, although traditions vary eg Purple or Red for the Patriarchs, the Prophets and John the Baptist with a rose colour for Mary on week 4. A white candle is usually used for Christmas Eve or Christmas Day.
